

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LEGISLATIVE COUNTY CONVENTION.

Extracts from General Statutes of New Hampshire.

The County Convention shall consist of the Representatives of the towns of the County,

On notice given by the Speaker, they shall meet on the second Wednesday of the June Session of the General Court, or other day in the same week; shall choose a Chairman and Clerk, and may adjourn as they see cause.

The County Treasurer shall make out and deliver to the County Commissioners a particular statement of the condition of the County Treasury, at the term of the Supreme Court next preceding the June Session of the General Court; and the Commissioners shall recommend to the County Convention the sum necessary to be raised for the County for the ensuing year.

Said statement and recommendation shall be transmitted by the County Commissioners to the Secretary of State, prior to the second Wednesday of June next ensuing, by whom it shall be delivered to the clerk of the County Convention upon request.

The County Convention shall have power to appoint two Auditors annually for the succeeding year, whose duty it shall be to examine the accounts of the County Commissioners and the County Treasurer, &c.

A record of the doings of such Convention shall be kept by the Clerk of the Convention, and shall be transmitted by him to the Clerk of the County Commissioners.

The apparent increase in weekly cost over last year, is accounted for by charging the farm with interest on its valuation, and by not deducting for improvements made on the farm, during the year, which have been large, such as building walls, quarrying stone, and reclaiming meadow, and which were formerly deducted from the yearly expense of farm.

COUNTY FARM PRODUCTS.

The crops of the Farm for the past year are estimated at about 90 tons of hay, 14 tons of straw, 2400 bushels of potatoes, 300 bushels of oats, 50 bushels of (dry) beans, 12 bushels of (dry) peas, 30 bushels onions, 60 bushels of beets, 1000 bushels of turnips, 45 bushels of cucumbers, 1400 heads of cabbage, 10 cartloads of pumpkins, 75 bushels of carrots, 2644 lbs of beef, 7020 lbs of pork, 785 lbs of butter, 395 dozen eggs, 6 calves, 89 pigs, 50 hens. A large amount of green vegetables used on the farm before harvest, are not enumerated.

PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

To the Commissioners of Rockingham County.

GENTLEMEN:—In making the sixth annual report of the sanitary condition of the Rockingham County Almshouse and House of Correction your physicians congratulate themselves on the prospect of the erection, during the coming season, of an asylum, which shall afford additional and more commodious accommodations for the insane, of which there are 56 now confined in the institutions; an increase of 20 during the past year. While the greater portion of these are quiet and harmless, many are so violent as to require constant restraint; and others are subject to periods of excitement, which render them the objects of constant watchfulness.

The old asylum, never adapted to this purpose, in consequence of the small size of its rooms and imperfect ventilation, has now become wholly inadequate for the needs of this unfortunate class. It affords accommodations for but 23, leaving 33 to be cared for in the main building, where no adequate barrier exists to their escape by windows and consequent self destruction or injury.

The plans submitted for the new building meet our entire approval. Though the rooms are not as large as in more pretentious institutions of this kind, they are, we believe, sufficiently spacious to afford pure air to one inmate, for which only they are designed. The facilities for ventilation are modern and in accordance with scientific opinion on this subject. This we consider of primary importance; for the patient while being able in some degree, to protect himself from heat and cold is powerless against poisonous gases which may enter his system with every breath.

There is in the institution another class more unfortunate if possible than the insane, viz: the children. While some are born here others find ingress at the tender age during which the plastic mind receives and retains the impressions incident to its surroundings. The wholesome benefits of parental restraint and home discipline are generally wholly unknown to them. Many have probably inherited the vicious

tendencies of their parents and with an education calculated to develop these tendencies, can we expect them to be aught but the progenitors of a race true to their origin?

While there has been a school in the institution taught by the inmates, it has not been such as to meet the requirements of this class. A teacher is needed whose influence in the right direction shall be positive and whom these children shall learn to love and respect. Many of them are bright, capable children and would, we believe, under favorable circumstances make useful citizens and members of society. Though the Superintendant and Commissioners have shown commendable zeal in furnishing homes for these waifs most of them are necessarily here for many months, and seldom have we less than twelve or fifteen four years of age and upwards.

The mortality during the past year has been light. No epidemic or contagious disease has prevailed. This has been due in a great measure, to the unusually mild winter, through which we have passed, and the scrupulous neatness observed and exercised in the care of the building and its inmates. Beds bedding and rooms are thoroughly cleaned and ventilated at frequent and regular intervals, and all inmates who are able, are required regularly to resort to the bath, under the direction and observance of a competent attendant.

The sick and feeble, numbering constantly from 30 to 40, are regularly fed from the table of the Superintendent and family. Food wholesome and suitable to their needs in quantity and quality, is provided and dealt out under the personal supervision of Mrs. Pollard, who has ever shown herself unremitting in her attentions to all, and especially to the sick and suffering. We would earnestly recommend the employment of a faithful nurse who, under her direction, shall have the general supervision of the ladies' wing and relieve her of a portion of this work and responsibility. These with other duties devolving upon her are altogether disproportionate to the physical endurance of any one individual.

During the past winter the number of inmates has been greater than before since the institution has been established; and in consequence the duties much of the time have been arduous. Many of these have been vagrants and outcasts from society whose only objects were to obtain abundant food, warm beds, and as little work as possible. As applicants for medical aid they were a constant source of annoyance. Schooled in this art they were generally well calculated to deceive, and none but the experienced physician can appreciate the devices to which they would resort to claim immunity from labor. When doubt existed they were given the benefit of it, but when deception was apparent they were remanded to the Superintendant and placed to work.

There have been three births and thirty-one deaths in the institution during the past year.

John Rhodes, admitted March 10, 1875, from Danville,

died May 4, 1875, of disease of the heart; aged 80 years.

Ellen Carroll, admitted October 4, 1873, from Portsmouth, died May 6, 1875, of consumption; aged 53 years.

Phebe Eaton, admitted December 21, 1870, from Seabrook, died May 9, 1875, of disease of the heart; aged 72 years.

Jonathan Lancaster, admitted December 31, 1873, from Epping, died June 11, 1875, of disease of the heart; aged 52 years.

Nancy White, admitted October 4, 1867, from Nottingham, died June 16, 1875, of consumption; aged 71 years.

Jane Dolloff, admitted October 7, 1867, from Raymond, died August 10, 1875, of paralysis; aged 67 years.

Hannah Pace, admitted December 18, 1871, from Chester, died September 5, 1875, of chronic ulcer of the stomach; aged 50 years.

Elizabeth Dame, admitted September 27, 1869, from Portsmouth, died January 22, 1875, of typhoid pneumonia; aged 71 years.

Mary Pitman, admitted September 21, 1875, from Portsmouth, died January 27, 1876, of paralysis; aged 78 years.

James W. McIntire, admitted January 6, 1876, from Fremont, died February 10, 1876, of consumption of bowels; aged 35 years.

James Murphy, admitted January 22, 1876, from Exeter, died February 11, 1876, of cerebro-spinal meningitis; aged 21 years.

Betsy Coffin, admitted December 31, 1871, from Londonderry, died February 16, 1876, of consumption; aged 53 years.

Kate Donovan, admitted December 27, 1876, from Portsmouth, died February 17, 1876, of dropsy from disease of kidneys; aged 61 years.

Ephraim Gale, admitted November 6, 1875, from Plaistow, died February 19, 1876, of disease of heart and chronic pleurisy; aged 77 years.

Rachel Heath, admitted April 29, 1875, from Plaistow, died February 27, 1876, of general debility; aged 72 years.

Ella Bean, admitted May 26, 1875, from Deerfield, died March 31, 1876, of pneumonia; aged 11½ months.

John Wilson, admitted May 3, 1875, from Sandown, died April 11, 1876, of disease of the heart; aged 81 years.

The above statement of deaths presents no deviation from former years worthy of remark. Eighty-three per cent of the cases have been upwards of 50 years of age; sixty-one upwards of 60; fifty upwards of 70; sixteen upwards of 80, and six upwards of 90.

The large number of chronic, and necessarily incurable, cases will not escape your attention. Seven have died of organic disease of the heart; five of consumption; four of progressive paralysis; two from general decline; two of pneumonia; and one each from epilepsy, chronic ulcer of stomach, disease of kidneys, disease of pancreas, erysipelas, cerebro-spinal meningitis, apoplexy, croup, typhoid fever, and delirium tremens.

There are now confined in the institution 56 insane, 29 idiotic, 10 blind, and 5 deaf mutes.

In conclusion we would express our gratitude to the Superintendent and wife for continued kindness, courtesy and co-operation in all our labors. Especial mention is due for efficient services, Mr. S. H. Swain, Miss Clark of the insane department, and the nurses generally.

GENTLEMEN: In submitting to you the following report of religious services held in behalf of the inmates of the County House, I am happy to say that everything has passed pleasantly, and I hope that all have been profited in some degree by these exercises. During the past year, as far as practicable, regular services with prayer, singing and a sermon have been held two Sabbaths in every month, commencing at about 1.15 o'clock, P. M.; the chapel has usually been well filled with attentive listeners, and an increase of interest has been more apparent during the past winter than at any former period. We have been reminded of the words of the Psalmist, where he says "for a day in thy Courts is better than a thousand." I wish here to speak of my gratitude towards the members of the Baptist choir and congregation for their constant attendance at the meetings and for their assistance in making these services interesting. On funeral occasions I have read the Scriptures and offered prayer when all connected with the house have been present as far as convenient. The most perfect order and quietness have been maintained throughout all our devotional exercises.

I have also as far as other engagements would permit, visited the inmates in their rooms for religious counsel and prayer, and it has given me pleasure to be received by them with so much cordiality and respect. As the institution remains but partially supplied with reading matter, it is hoped that friends will continue to forward pamphlets, papers and books for the benefit of the inmates, which will be thankfully received in the future as they have been in the past. Desiring the future prosperity of the institution, together with the excellent Superintendent and his family and the assistants, who have so heartily aided in devising and carrying forward means for the spiritual elevation of those under their care.

In the foregoing reports and the report of the Treasurer annexed, we present an exhibit of the affairs of the county during the past year.

It will appear by the report of the Treasurer that the county debt has been increased by the amount of \$12,811.24, which increase has been caused by the larger number of convicts and paupers on and off the farm, the increase of Justices' and Officers' fees, and the settlement of claims pending from former years.

The law relative to pauper settlements, passed at the last

session of the Legislature, added about one hundred to the number of county paupers.

The law relative to vagrants, passed at that session, appears to have been generally enforced, and has tended to increase the number of convicts sentenced to the House of Correction, and to add to the expenses for their arrest, trial, commitment and support.

The fee for committing prisoners to the House of Correction do not appear to be specified by statute, and we have allowed such a sum as appeared reasonable.

As the fee has been thought by some to be so large as to encourage the arrest and conviction of vagrants, we invite an expression of the Convention as to the sum that should be allowed to officers for that service.

The foundations for the new Asylum are prepared, and we expect to close the contracts for the completion of the building immediately.

A steady improvement in the productive capacity of the farm is going on, and upon the completion of the Asylum, it would seem that unless some unforeseen accident should occur, no further appropriations for buildings would be required.

Arrangements have been made to establish a school for the children at the farm.

We concur in the suggestions of the Treasurer, and especially ask your consideration of his recommendation relative to funding the floating debt.

Should the Convention decide to make a further appropriation for the new Index of Deeds, we recommend that such appropriation be in addition to the amount of estimated expenses submitted in our report.

We return our thanks to those who have kindly contributed to the happiness of the inmates at the farm, by presents of books, papers and other articles, and assure all interested in the unfortunate, that such favors will be thankfully received and appreciated.

We respectfully renew the suggestion made by a former board, that a time be fixed for the commencement of the term of service of County officers. We believe the present custom to be unsatisfactory, liable to abuse, and that it might result in detriment to the county. It would not be convenient in this report, to give our reasons
